

BUCKS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

May 21, 2008

The Regular Meeting of the Bucks County Board of Commissioners was held on Wednesday, May 21, 2008 at 10:00 a.m. at the Lingohocken Fire Company, 1090 Washington Avenue, Wycombe, PA. In attendance were Commissioner James F. Cawley, Chairman, Commissioner Charles H. Martin and Commissioner Diane M. Ellis-Marseglia. Commissioner Cawley opened the meeting with a moment of silence, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

Commissioner Cawley announced that the meeting will be recorded to allow audio playback on the County's website.

INTRODUCTIONS

Commissioner Cawley thanked Lingohocken Fire Company for hosting today's meeting. He introduced Company Chief, Wayne Murphy, Jr., who thanked everyone for coming and spoke about the history of the fire company and the organization it has grown into. He said the company is approaching its 100th anniversary and a committee has already started working on the celebration that will take place in 2013. He thanked the community for their support over the years and announced that they are actively accepting memberships. The Commissioners presented Chief Murphy and the Company with a County Flag.

Commissioner Cawley acknowledged County elected officials who were present: Bill Snyder, Treasurer, Ray McHugh, Controller, Duke Donnelly, Sheriff, Mary Smithson, Clerk of Courts and Ed Gudknecht, Recorder of Deeds.

He also recognized local elected officials: Wrightstown Board of Supervisors Chairman, Chester Pogonowski, who is also the President of the Lingohocken Fire Company, Newtown Township Supervisor, Mike Gallagher, and Dottie Fiedler representing Scott Petri's office.

PROCLAMATIONS

The Commissioners proclaimed May 19–25, 2008 as "NATIONAL RECREATIONAL WATER ILLNESS PREVENTION WEEK" throughout the County of Bucks urging all Bucks Countians to take proper health precautions prior to enjoying aquatic activities. Meta Michener, along with Andy Schafer of the Bucks County Health Department, accepted and expressed their appreciation for the proclamation. Meta spoke about water illness prevention and stressed the importance of clean pools and healthy swimming behavior.

The Commissioners recognized Central Bucks High School East student, Sarah Denaci, as Bucks County's "2008 HIGH SCHOOL POET OF THE YEAR" commending her for her contribution to the literary tradition of our community. Miss Denaci accepted, thanked the Commissioners for the recognition and recited her winning poem "Sun Lunges into a Spring".

The Commissioners proclaimed June 7–14, 2008 as "HABITAT BUCKS – WOMEN BUILD WEEK" throughout the County of Bucks saluting Habitat for Humanity for its many efforts to support the community it serves. Habitat Bucks members Beth Adams, Linda Andrews and Kim Noble, accepted and thanked the Commissioners for their support. They spoke about the success of the Women Build Program and the tremendous response from volunteers. They said they truly believe home ownership changes lives and expressed their appreciation for all the generous support.

The Commissioners proclaimed May 18–24, 2008 as "EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES WEEK" throughout the County of Bucks honoring the women and men whose professional diligence serves to keep Bucks County residents safe. Emergency Health Services Director, Jeryl Degideo accepted along with members of the Bucks County EMS community, Evan Resnikoff, President, Chiefs Association, Kermit Gorr, St. Lukes Hospital and Chuck Pressler, Central Bucks Ambulance. They thanked the Commissioners for their support throughout the year as well as the municipal governments and residents that help them go out and do what they do everyday. They said as this is EMS Week, it is an opportunity to bring attention to financial support and recruitment and added that they are always looking for dedicated people.

Commissioner Cawley commented that he had the opportunity to go to the Garden of Reflection in Lower Makefield on Sunday and was met by several EMS representatives who were biking from New York City to Roanoke, VA in recognition of EMS Memorial Week. Jeryl Degideo added that the bike ride ends on May 24th in Roanoke where there will be a service for Line of Duty Death.

PUBLIC COMMENT – Agenda Items

The following individuals spoke regarding Agenda Item 8a, Proposed Rules and Regulations Governing Public Bathing Places, which was Tabled at the May 7, 2008 meeting and listed to be Untabled on today's agenda.

Henry Bockstein, V.P., Maintenance & Engineering and Jeff Davis, V.P., Operations of Sesame Place in Langhorne, read a statement explaining Sesame Places' position on the Rules and Regulations and expressed concerns regarding the development process. They spoke about the credentials of their corporate director, John Linn, and relayed his recommendations that the Rules and Regulations be Tabled until a later date. They added that Mr. Linn is available to meet and discuss any outstanding issues and said Sesame Place would simply like to have a voice with the Department of Health prior to the regulations being passed.

The following individuals spoke in support of the Rules and Regulations and publicly thanked Meta Michener and Andy Schafer of the Health Department for meeting with the group of swim club owners/managers and listening to their recommended changes. They said they understand the concerns of Sesame Place and agree that pool operators should be consulted before the regulations are approved, but they do, however, believe the document is fine and encouraged the Commissioners to approve it with the discussed changes incorporated. They commended the Commissioners for bringing attention to water illness prevention and said they look forward to working with the Department of Health and making people more aware of recreational water safety.

Robin Hoey, President of Bucks County Food Shed Alliance and Wrightstown Township Environmental Council, spoke about the food shed alliance and said their mission is to build a local, sustainable food supply. She explained how the organization supports farmers and said with the increase in food and fuel prices, she recognizes a greater need to grow food locally. She thanked the Commissioners for their interest and support of farm markets, which have tripled throughout the county in the last year, and thanked them for approving Agricultural Land Preservation items such as the one on today's agenda.

PRESENTATION

Jerry Lepping, Executive Director, Bucks County Conference and Visitors Bureau along with Bill Haas, Board President, presented each Commissioner with a copy of Life Magazine's 100 Dream Destinations, which has listed Bucks County, Pennsylvania as one of their feature destinations. Mr. Lepping read an excerpt from the magazine's article highlighting the beauty of Bucks and said he is very proud that the Commissioners have supported the open space efforts throughout the county. He thanked them on behalf of the Board of Directors, Conference and Visitors Bureau staff and many marketing partners throughout the county.

OLD BUSINESS

Upon motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Ms. Ellis-Marseglia, with the vote being 3-0, the Minutes of the May 7, 2008 meeting were approved. It was noted that corrections are to be made to the Motion for Board Appointments (Pg. 9) and the recording of Ms. Ellis-Marseglia No vote (Pg. 10, Para. 9).

DISCUSSION/AGENDA RELATED ITEMS

Rich Harvey, Agriculture Land Preservation, spoke on item 2a. Finance Director, Brian Hessenthaler, provided information on the funding and bond money for this item.

Brian Duke, Area Agency on Aging, spoke on item 3a.

Vitor Vicente, Community and Business Development, spoke on items 4a and 4b.

Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia posed questions regarding funding for the Lower Bucks Homeless Shelter, grant applications, and money specifically earmarked for the Shelter. Commissioner Cawley provided clarification on the contributions made from the house and senate as well as requirements on how the funds could be used. Mr. Vicente provided information on the grant application and funding cuts and Joe Funk added that there were additional grant awards made directly to the shelter.

Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia also asked for more information on the application and approval process of 4b. Mr. Vicente responded that this item will formalize acceptance of funding that was approved in February and authorized the allocation of funding for community and housing projects. Commissioner Cawley asked Vitor to provide a list of the different projects that will be receiving the various allocations.

John Dougherty, Emergency Management, spoke on item 6b. Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia requested this item be tabled as she did not have adequate time to review a list of the regional projects. Mr. Dougherty responded that the county is a pass-through for funding on this item. David Sanko added that the plan was already submitted to the

state and approved by Homeland Security and the acceptance of this is just an administrative function.

Bill Mitchell, Parks and Recreation, spoke on item 10a. He also spoke on Public Works items 12a-d. Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia asked for clarification on why the change order was needed on item 12e. Mr. Mitchell responded that the additional work was required by Motorola for grounding equipment and was not in the original bid or plan. He said the funding will come from the bond issue that was set aside for the construction of the 911 center.

Chief Operating Officer, David Sanko, spoke on item 12e.

Harris Gubernick, Corrections, responded to Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia’s questions regarding item 5a and stated that the core product has been installed and components are being added on. He said that money was set aside for the whole project, but cameras are to be purchased as the installation moves along.

Andy Schaffer and Meta Michener, Health Department, spoke on item 8a. A discussion took place regarding the input of public pool owners and managers so their recommendations can be considered. Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia suggested this item again be Tabled in order to allow the input of Sesame Place and other pools unrepresented at yesterday’s meeting. Commissioners Martin and Cawley recommended that as a matter of public safety, and the fact that pool season had essentially started, that the Rules and Regulations be approved today subject to additional revisions. A discussion took place about some of the revisions that were made and whether or not this item should be re-listed on the next agenda. Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia’s motion failed due to lack of a second.

NEW BUSINESS

Upon motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Ms. Ellis-Marseglia, with the vote being 3-0, the following Resolutions were approved with the exception of items 4b, 8a and 12a which were opposed by Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia, but approved with the vote being 2-1-0. It was noted that item 8a was modified to include the revisions incorporated from the previous day’s meeting between the Health Department and pool operators. Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia requested that item 8a be readdressed at the next Commissioners meeting.

Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia asked whether the positions had been advertised and also inquired as to the reason for the change in item 15. Responses were provided by Regina Armitage, Solicitor’s Office, Carmen Thome, Human Resources and Don Jacobs, Information Services.

MISCELLANEOUS

Upon motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Ms. Ellis-Marseglia, with the vote being 2-0-1, the following Miscellaneous Agenda Item was approved. Commissioner Cawley abstained from the vote and provided follow-up correspondence regarding the abstention which will be attached and made of record.

Adopt Ordinance No. 132 for financing by the Bucks County Community College Authority for the purpose of providing funds for the Capital Expansion Program.

AND the proper officers are authorized to execute all documents necessary to carry this Resolution into effect.

Gordon Walker, Public Financial Management and Paul Clancy, Wachovia Securities Underwriter, spoke about the bond issue and credit ratings of the County and Community College. Mr. Clancy spoke about the successful sale of the bonds as well some of the College's upcoming projects the funding will be used for.

Public Comment – Ordinance 132: None

David M. Sanko, Chief Operating Officer, reported on the following matter(s):

Prison Reform – Mr. Sanko reported that since our last meeting, Senator Greenleaf has successfully fostered the prison reform packages through the senate judiciary committee and we expect final consideration and passage by the senate before the summer.

Election Turnout – The Board of Elections has completed the final figures for voter turnout this past election and Mr. Sanko reported the percentages recorded for the county.

OTHER BUSINESS

Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia asked for a status of her request for a list of the county fleet of automobiles. David Sanko responded that the list was almost complete, he is looking it over to make sure it is correct and will hopefully have it out to her soon.

Ms. Ellis-Marseglia also commented that Pennel Borough is looking for a letter of commitment on a TMA related project and is asking for support from the County. Lynn Bush, Planning Commission, stated that the County has supported grant applications on similar projects and she would be happy to help Pennel Borough with their request.

PUBLIC COMMENT – GENERAL

Melissa Scott, a Doylestown resident, stated that she videotaped and interviewed voters in Lower Bucks County on Primary Election Day and asked the Commissioners if some measure exists to ensure that the vote is counted if someone does not fully press the green button. Commissioner Cawley and Deena Dean responded that it is against the state directive for election officials to help voters in that manner and Commissioner Martin questioned Ms. Scott as to how she had discovered the problem. She explained that she interviewed an election judge and discovered discrepancies between the number of voters that checked in and the number of votes on the machines. Upon request, Glenn Hains, Solicitor, agreed to look further into how restricted the directive's instruction is when dealing with a fleeing voter. Upon Commissioner Cawley's request, Ms. Scott agreed to share the tape with the Commissioners.

Gallus Obert, a Fairless Hills resident, inquired about the status of minutes from the March 4, 2008 CVI meeting and requested that his name be changed in the April minutes to reflect his correct spelling. He also inquired about the purchase of assistance equipment for hearing impaired attendees at meetings. Mr. Obert asked when the next scheduled meeting of the Board of Elections would be held and posed a series of questions regarding the voters erroneously placed in Region 2 and claimed that residents are being denied proper representation at school board meetings.

Commissioner Cawley replied that the minutes from some earlier meetings were still being prepared. Mr. Sanko responded that the hearing assistance issue has been referred to the ADA committee for review and further recommendations. Commissioner Martin responded that a BOE meeting has not yet been scheduled but said Mr. Obert will be informed when a date is set. In reference to his concerns of the Region 2 voting district, Commissioner Martin explained that the issue is being administratively handled by the Board of Elections but it will be up to the courts to decide if the person will continue to serve in the office he was elected to.

Ruth Matheny, a Doylestown Borough resident, spoke about the previous evening's viewing of the film "Uncounted" in which the Danaher voting machine was briefly described as questionable technology. Ms. Matheny requested that Mr. Cawley sign a document asking for a re-examination of the Danaher voting machine by the Department of State. Commissioner Cawley did not sign the request and said he has been very clear on his position that if the rules are changed by either the federal or state government, that the county will comply. He added that if there is an expense due to a change, he hopes appropriate funding will be provided.

Melissa Scott spoke regarding the discussion of personnel item 15 and requested that public notices of job openings be posted. Mr. Cawley explained that it is the county's desire to promote internally in order to provide incentives to employees and afford other opportunities within the county. He said there is a posting procedure that is used through our website and each position is given careful review by the Department of Human Resources. A discussion followed regarding County policy and the posting of jobs on the County website.

Ruth Matheny spoke about the possibility of regular public meetings with the Board of Elections before the Commissioner's Meetings. Mr. Sanko and Commissioner Ellis-Marseglia responded.

ANNOUNCEMENTS
